





The first event of the academic year 2018-19 was a talk by Prof. Hephzibah Israel (University of Edinburgh) on *Translating Biblical Narratives in Colonial India*. In a well attended talk on 3<sup>rd</sup> August,2018 Prof. Israel, an alumnus of the MH, English Dept. traced the history of different translations of the Bible's stories in colonized India.







In an interactive session with the English Department students on Aug. 20th, Ms. Navjit Kaur, an MH alumnus and a PhD student at Princeton University talked about how to write an impressive SOP while applying to various universities.






On 1<sup>st</sup> October, there was a panel discussion on the book

Of Indian Origin: Writings from Australia (co-hosted by Orient BlackSwan). The panel consisted of playwright and novelist, Suneeta Peres Da Costa, Dr. Meenakshi Bharat, Assoc Professor, Dept of English at Venkateshwara College and Dr. Shweta Sachdeva Jha, Assistant Professor, English Dept., MH



Of Indian Origin is a collection of short stories and poetry by Australian writers of Indian origin. Though the field of Indian-Australian writing is still small, this vibrant mix of emerging and established writers shows it is by no means a homogenous entity. Bold, experimental and original, Of Indian Origin unapologetically tackles issues of home and provides a unique overview of how Indian-Australian literary writing has developed over half a century.





The event held on 10<sup>th</sup> October examined the classical writings of Ovid in the context of the contemporary #Me Too Movement and the questions related to violence against women that it raises. The two-pronged event began with a presentation by the retired Associate Professor of JMC, and editor of several books, Dr. Harriet Raghunathan and was followed by an immensely exciting paper by a group of first year students on Ovid's *Philomela* and # Me Too.

Ek Inquilab aur Aaya directed by noted historian, feminist and filmmaker Uma Chakravarti traces the lives and rebellions of two women living in Lucknow in the early half of the 19<sup>th</sup> century. The screening of the film on 31<sup>st</sup> October was followed by a panel discussion on the film, its polity and subversion of patriarchal narratives with Uma Chakravarti, Anupama Chandra and Deepika Tandon.











The V. Krishna Event organized by the Dept. was an interactive session with Jayanti K Utampala, an alumnus, who scaled the Everest. The event was titled, *On Top Of The World: Scaling Everest and Breaking Gender Stereotypes*, and was held on Friday, January 18.





The Literary Society event for the academic year was held on 5th and 6th of February. by addressing the film Padmavat-a recent film based on the legend of the 14th century queen that ruffled a lot of feathers after its release. It becomes significant to look into the mediation of a mytho-legendary past as history in the context of contemporary political preoccupations and its propagation of cultural stereotypes serving the Hindutva agendaespecially that of the marauding sexualised Muslim King and the chaste Hindu woman as Sati. The event began with an interactive session with the renowned historian Professor Emeritus Romila Thapar. The second session was a panel discussion on the film. The speakers were Professor Ira Bhaskar of the School of Arts & Aesthetics, JNU, Dr. Pankaj Jha, Dept of History, LSR and Ms. Suparna Sharma of the Asian Age.


