- Speaker Sessions:
- o Concept of the Indeterminate in the Renaissance (Prof. Shirshendu Chakrabarti):
- Prof. Shirshendu Chakrabarti led a captivating speaker session providing attendees with insightful perspectives on the Renaissance. The discussion focused on the historical shift from a theocentric to an anthropocentric worldview during this transformative period in European history.
