In India, women's participation in politics and rural development has been receiving increasing attention and importance. Rajasthan is known for its patriarchal social norms and traditional gender roles. Despite constitutional and state-level efforts to increase women's representation, women's leadership, effective and active participation in rural politics remains limited and many women are unable to fully engage in political processes and decision-making. By examining the factors that influence women's participation in rural politics in Rajasthan, this study seeks to identify the complex interplay of social, cultural, economic, and political factors that shape women's participation in local governance structures.</p> <p>The research involved a combination of primary and secondary sources, and also a comparative analysis.</p> <p>We conducted eight literature reviews.</p> <p>From these literature reviews, we found that issues like representation in politics where women are dominated by their male relatives, patriarchy, illiteracy, and other social and cultural barriers further limit women's independence. However, most studies have focused only on representation in high-ranking political offices, and few studies have delved deep into the specific challenges women face in Rajasthan's unique socio-political environment. Therefore, there is a need to explore the specific challenges related to caste, gender norms, and economic barriers in Rajasthan's local government structure.</p> <p>Fieldwork was conducted for this study in Village Panchayat, Jhunjhuni District, Rajasthan. The interviews highlight the challenges rural women face in participating in local political organizations. Patriarchal norms and male influence often limit their decision-making roles, with many of the decisions of female village chiefs being made by their husbands. But with education</p>

Kammint hang	<p>TITLE: THE IMPACT OF WOMEN'S RESERVATION ACT, 2023 ON THE ASPIRATIONS OF YOUNG WOMEN: A CASE STUDY OF MIRANDA HOUSE, UNIVERSITY OF DELHI.</p> <p>INTRODUCTION: This research tries to examine the impact of "The Women's Reservation Act, 2023", on the aspirations of the young women of Miranda House, University of Delhi. The concept of gender-based reservation has been a subject of longstanding debate and contestation in India's political discourse. After nearly thirty years of deliberation, the Indian Parliament, through 128th Constitutional Amendment, passed a landmark bill, named as the "Nari Shakti Vandan Adhiniyam" (Women's Reservation Bill) on 19th September, mandating a 33% (one-third) reservation of seats for women in Lok Sabha and State Legislative Assemblies, including those reserved for SCs and STs. This historic legislation would not only enhance women's political representation in the world's largest democracy but also signify a broader promise of empowering women, positively influencing the aspirations of the young women. The reservation will be effective after the publication of the census conducted following the Act's commencement and endures for a 15-year period, with potential extension determined by parliamentary action.</p> <p>HYPOTHESIS: The Women's Reservation Act, 2023 has a positive impact on the aspirations of young women.</p> <p>RATIONALE: The Women's Reservation Act, 2023, has been passed in response to the challenges to women's participation in politics. The need for affirmative action to improve the status of women in Indian society is one of the main arguments in favour of the bill. For most women, the intertwined constraints of gender, class, caste, violence, financial challenges, low literacy rates and workforce participation, mobility restrictions and other discriminations, exacerbated by the pervasive influence of patriarchy, create intricate challenges to their full</p>

PDS is operated under the joint responsibility of the Central and the State Governments.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Central Government, through Food Corporation of India (FCI), has assumed the responsibility for procurement, storage, transportation and bulk allocation of food grains to the State Governments. The operational responsibilities including allocation within the State, identification of eligible families, issue of Ration Cards and supervision of the functioning of Fair Price Shops (FPSs) etc., rest with the State Governments. <p>Historical Background</p> <p>PDS was introduced around World War II as a war-time rationing measure. Before the 1960s, distribution through PDS was generally dependent on imports of food grains. It was expanded in the 1960s as a response to the food shortages of the time; subsequently, the government set up the Agriculture Prices Commission and the FCI to improve domestic procurement and storage of food grains for PDS.</p> <p>Till 1992, PDS was a general entitlement scheme for all consumers without any specific target.</p> <p>The Revamped Public Distribution System (RPDS) was launched in June, 1992 with a view to strengthen and streamline the PDS as well as to improve its reach in the far-flung, hilly, remote and inaccessible areas where a substantial section of the underprivileged classes lives.</p>

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

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
