#### Overview of the Society

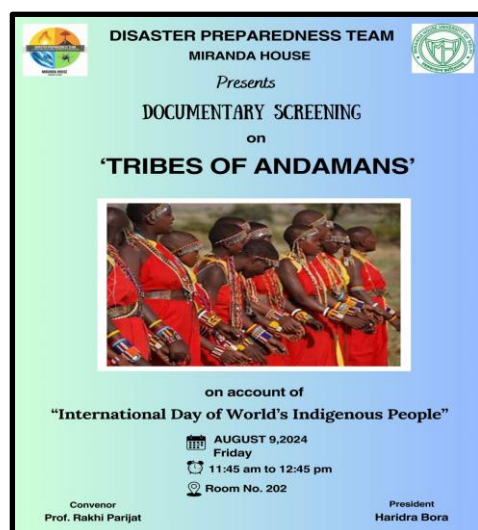

Started in 2015 as a voluntary group, it became a society in January 2020. Through the society, students had been engaged in funded research projects along with multiple in-house activities for capacity building and outreach events.

The society also works with CESDM or Centre for Environmental Studies and Disaster Management, a Research Centre in our college to foster a culture of disaster resilience in the institution. It often collaborates with other societies for effective implementation of disaster preparedness plans.

#### DOCUMENTARY SCREENING ON 'TRIBES OF ANDAMANS'

**Date-9 August, 2024**

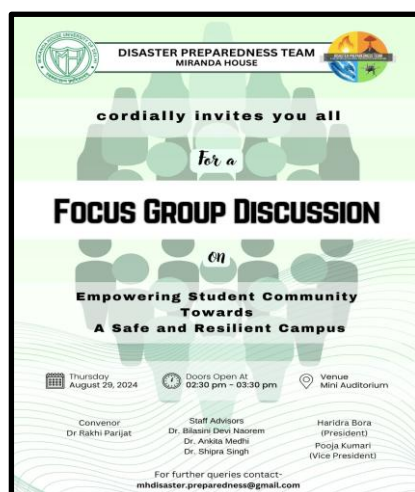


On the occasion of the **International Day of the World's Indigenous Peoples**, the **Disaster Preparedness Team (DPT)**, **Miranda House**, organized a documentary screening on 9 August 2024 from 11:45 a.m. to 12:45 p.m. The documentary 'Tribes of Andamans' described the lives of native people of the Andaman and Nicobar Islands including their cultural practices, social organizations and knowledge system. It also highlighted their geopolitical situation and problems they experience because of their environmental insecurities, foreign intrusions, and the pressures of development.

The purpose of the screening was to address the students to the awareness of the rich cultural heritage of indigenous culture and misfortunes and loss that they have to face because of marginalization and natural calamity risks. The event was attended by students from different departments and they all experienced it as a learning and eye-opening workshop as it motivated them to ask themselves some critical questions about sustainability and inclusivity.

**DATE: 29 August 2024**

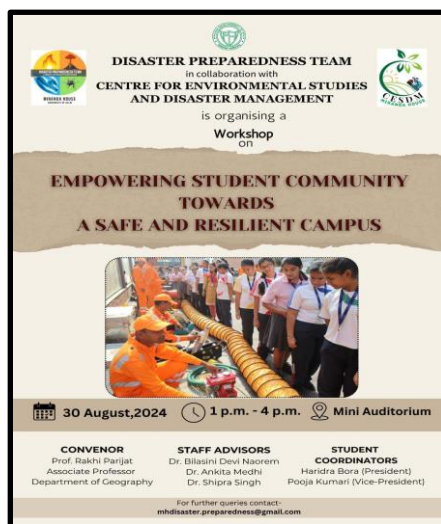

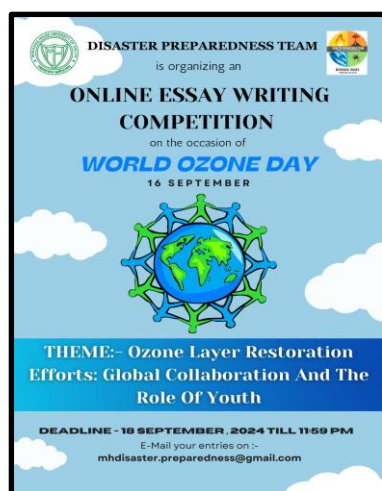

## **ONLINE ESSAY WRITING COMPETITION**

**16 September 2024**

**On the Occasion of World Ozone Day**, the Disaster Preparedness Team successfully organized an Online Essay Writing Competition on 16 September 2024 to commemorate World Ozone Day. The event aimed to raise awareness about the significance of the ozone layer and to encourage students to critically engage with global environmental issues.



The competition revolved around the theme **“Ozone Layer Restoration Efforts: Global Collaboration and the Role of Youth.”** The theme highlighted the urgent need for collective international action to protect the ozone layer while emphasizing the crucial role young individuals play in promoting sustainable practices and environmental stewardship. Participants were invited to articulate their perspectives on ozone depletion, restoration strategies such as the Montreal Protocol, and innovative youth-led initiatives contributing to environmental conservation. The essays reflected a deep understanding of the ozone layer as the *elixir of life* and showcased thoughtful insights into how collaborative global efforts, policy interventions, and individual responsibility can pave the way for a healthier planet.

The competition witnessed enthusiastic participation from students, who demonstrated creativity, critical thinking, and a strong sense of environmental responsibility through their submissions. The online format ensured wider accessibility and encouraged inclusive participation inspiring participants to adopt a restorative approach towards nature and contribute actively to a sustainable future.

The Disaster Preparedness Team (DPT) of Miranda House organised summer Research Forum '25 on the topic “Holistic Resilience- Linking Disasters, Environment & Health” in June- July 2025. The forum explored seven dynamic subtopics to tackle pressing contemporary issues:

- Urban Heat and Vulnerability Mapping
- Campus Plastic Audit & Waste Segregation
- Mobile Disaster Alert Simulation
- Monsoon Migration: Bihar Case Study
- GIS Flood zone mapping
- Wildlife Shift Monitoring
- Antimicrobial Resistance Awareness

By linking these dimensions, the forum stressed the need for inclusive, sustainable, and long-term approaches to disaster management rather than short-term relief measures.
