Film Screening on Garment Factory Workers and Campus

Rising was organised by the Women's Development Cell in collaboration with One Billion Rising Campaign on 1st of February, 2017. The aim was to rise in solidarity against exploitation of working women. The members participated in a film screening which was followed by a march. As 1 in 3 women across the planet are either beaten or raped, we rose to show our determination to create a new kind of consciousness.

The screening was held in the Seminar Hall and around 120 students attended the event.



"1 in 3 women across the planet will be beaten or raped during her lifetime. That's ONE BILLION WOMEN AND GIRLS. Every February, we rise – in hundreds of countries across the world – to show our local communities and the world what one billion looks like and shine a light on the rampant impunity and injustice that survivors most often face. We rise through dance to express joy and community and and celebrate the fact that we have not been defeated by this violence. 

South Asian Young Women Leadership


Conference was organised by the Women's
