A photo booth was also organised near Nescafe lawns and over 70 students became a part of this event.






Discussion on Sikh Massacre






International Day of Girl Child Quiz






Breast Cancer Awareness Month

The event was held in the New Seminar Room. Over 60 students and teachers participated in this extremely informative awareness session.






Film Festival: Gender, Masculinity and Relationships

Sessions held on 4 April 2018

Session 1: Interactive Session, Women in Movements, by Kamla Bhasin and Suneeta Dhar


Renowned feminists and social workers Kamla Bhasin and Suneeta Dhar discussed various meanings and strands of the larger women's On movement. their insistence, the students engaged in highly а stimulating session on their everyday stories of resistance.



Session 2: Dr Bijaylakshmi Nanda, Associate Professor of the Department of Political Science at Miranda House, Divya Vaishnava, a social worker and founder of BUD Foundation, and Preeti Choudhury, author and lecturer, talked about various ways in which the culture of accountability can be remoulded in the context of sexual harassment and the issue of consent. It was followed by a round of Q&A with the audience that led to heated debates between the panelists and the students.

Session 3: What's on Screen? Gender and Media by Rakhee Bakshee and Richa Aniruddh

Rakhee Bakshee and Richa Aniruddh, journalists by profession, talked about the stigma and prevalent biases against female journalists. They concluded, after a vigorous Q&A session, that although there have been changes in the media now, women who are going to pursue this career still have a long journey to endure.






Session 4: Roundtable Discussion on Institutionalised Sexual Violence in the University Spaces


Sessions held on 5 April 2018

Session 1: Stories of Acid Attack Survivors

The event was held in collaboration with Acid Survivors Foundation India (ASFI). Chandrahas Mishra and Ms. Geeta, acid attack survivors, shared their stories of survival and dealing with the stigma that came with the horrific incidents that occurred with them. Mr. Mishra of ASFI shared difficulties that survivors face in getting treatment,

overcoming their mental and physical trauma and seeking support from the government.







Session 2: Women in Conflict Areas

Panellists included Rita Manchanda, a well-known journalist and research scholar, Mehroosh, a student of psychology of law at Jamia Milia Islamia and Samreen Mushtaq, a doctoral candidate at the Department of Political Science at Jamia Milia Islamia. Speakers talked about the various shades of problems and identities that women grapple with in conflict-ridden areas with special reference to the Kashmir dispute.

Session 3: Masculinity and Consent

The panel consisted of Suraj Pawar, social activist and program coordinator of Azad Foundation, Pavel Sagolsem, research scholar and program associate at Centre for Health and Social Justice and Dhruv Pandey, Assistant Professor at the Women's Studies and Development Centre, University of Delhi. The discussion brought forth various facets of the gender roles attributed to men and how consent plays a role in our everyday lives.





Session 4: Challenges faced by the LGBTQIA+ community

Speakers included Aroh Akunth, a Dalit and queer activist and member of the Queer Collective at Ambedkar University, Ritambbara Mehta, the co-founder of Nazariya and Rudrani Chhetri, a well-known transgender activist from Delhi. Kabir Trivedi, the founder. The session was moderated by the President of the Miranda House Queer Collective. The discussion veered towards the queer and Dalit politics in India especially the issues of identity, harassment, and marginalisation these communities face.



Film Screening: That Day after Everyday

The two-day festival ended with a screening of Anurag Kashyap's *That Day after Everyday*, an award-winning film on the problems faced by women every day in public spaces.
