A total of 133 participants attended.

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


**Creative Writing Competition** was held on 20.10.2022. The event was open to all students of Miranda House on the prompt "Talking Feminism to Our Foremothers"


30 participants were present in the event.



A total of 25 participants attended the session.

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



**Gumaan Series** is an initiative to understand individuality, identity and to discursively know about gender, caste, sexuality and class in accordance with it.


40 participants were present in the event.

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**Abhivyakti**, an Online Photography Competition was held on 10.11.2022. The event created a space for Gender and Photography to intersect.


A total of 30 participated in the competition.

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Orientation 2022 was held on 15.11.2022 at 5 pm. The session introduced WDC to the first semester students.


40 students participated in the Orientation.



Members engaged to gain a holistic understanding of such criteria with references from colonial past to the present India.


A total of 40 participated in the walk.

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## The STEM Gap




The Women's Development Cell at Miranda House, in collaboration with Aaina, successfully organized an enlightening workshop on 'The STEM Gap' on 8.2.2023. This initiative aimed to address the underrepresentation of women and gender minorities in STEM fields. Facilitated by experts Sayan and Vrinda, the workshop delved into exploring the gender gap in STEM and addressed related questions. Aaina, dedicated to encouraging critical reflection on educational experiences, played a pivotal role in bringing forth perspectives linking learning to society, history, and culture.

Aaina's team, actively engaged in creating content on social media platforms, particularly Instagram, shares research-based insights on education. They document the diverse experiences of students and teachers, fostering conversations on re-imagining education as empowering and transformative for all, transcending privilege. The collaborative workshop provided a platform for meaningful discussions and marked a significant step toward promoting inclusivity and gender equity in STEM education.

25 students participated in the workshop.





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BlueQuill, the Creative Writing Club of Miranda House, in collaboration with the Women's Development Cell, Miranda House, held a Panel Discussion on 'Crime & Institutions' as a part of BlueQuill's Annual Fest: ONCE UPON A CRIME. The event was organised on 15.2.2023.

To talk about crime and literature is to first deal with the obstacle of defining crime. More often than not, there exist institutions with monopoly of power and coercive consequences who decide what may be deemed as criminal activity. To act outside such boundaries is to then indulge in criminal behavior. How do we deem what is crime and how it is defined by pre - existing powerful institutions? This is one of many questions that we seek to understand through this panel discussion.


Around 45 students attended the event.


#### A visit to national Gallery of Modern Art

The Graphics Department of the Women's Development Cell successfully hosted an art walk to the National Gallery of Modern Art on Saturday, 11.2.2023. Participants immersed themselves in the diverse array of artistic expressions, creating a vibrant experience that enriched their understanding of modern art.

Around 30 students participated.

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Marginalised groups have used zines worldwide to publish their opinions and create awareness within and beyond communities since the mid-20th century using an amateur press. Naturally then, self-published zines have also played a major role in accelerating feminist, queer and anti-caste movements.

WDC organised **Zines on Reels** - an E-Zine Making Competition on the theme of Gender and Cinema Culture. The event was announced on 2 March 2023. Participants were asked to create e-zines, exploring ideas and concepts of Gender as it is represented in film and cinema. Participants were encouraged to explore the theme through a larger intersectional feminist lens. **The last date of submission was 26.3.2023.** 

A total of 20 participated in the competition.

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

Over 70 students participated in various events held as part of the Fest.

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

A total of 30 participated in the competition.

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
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A speaker session was held on 5.4.2023 on the topic: **The Politics of Un/Covered Bodies: Women, Dress and Choice** by Ambar Ahmad, an Associate Professor of Political Science in Kamla Nehru College, University of Delhi.

While the choice has long been contested as the right of the agent, women however, have been largely subjected to unsolicited patriarchal frontiers that question and impose projection of power over the Women's decision of un/covering themselves. While many political forces have joined the long prescriptive structures of 'telling women what to do', we must understand the issue with respect to women's embodiment of choice.

Around 20 participated in the event.





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

Around 25 members from WDC participated in the session.





A total of 20 were present in the discussion.

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
As the concluding event of Gender Mela 2023, Women's Development Cell, Miranda House **organised screening of the movie Trans Kashmir,** directed by S.A. Hanan and Surbhi Devan. The movie, as the title suggests, portrays the lives and difficulties of Trans people in Kashmir. It is about the extreme hardships, resilience and beauty of Kashmir's transgender community and their growing movement for basic human rights.

The screening was followed by an interactive session with one of the directors of the movie, Surbhi Dewan. She graduated with an MFA in film from Rochester Institute of Technology, New York, and is an independent producer and filmmaker who is known for 'An Open Sky', 'The Great Indian Rope Trick' 'Trans Kashmir'.

Around 30 students attended the movie screening.



Women's Development Cell in collaboration with The Philosophy Project (TPP) organised a speaker session on **Reproductive Rights and Laws in Neo-Liberal Era**. Speakers for the session were Dr. Harleen Kaur, Assistant Professor at Campus Law Centre, Faculty of Law, Delhi University and Ms. Naina Bhargava, founder of TPP and student at Campus Law Centre, DU. The session was held at 10:30 am, 6.4.2023 in the Mini Auditorium.



Reproductive rights are Human rights and it is important to be aware of and understand the laws that govern and protect them. Inadequate legal knowledge may have an impact on how different genders access the healthcare system or seek services, and it is likely to contribute to the gap between official laws and practical applications. For gender minorities, especially those who identify as transgender, non-binary, or intersex, knowledge of reproductive legislation is crucial. This is because reproductive regulations frequently place a strong emphasis on binary gender distinctions and may overlook the interests and rights of gender minorities. A total of 35 members from WDC were present in the event.


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#### Part B

## Participation in the conduct of elections of students' representatives to ICC

The Women's Development Cell facilitated the election of student representatives to the Gender Sensitising Committee (GSC) and the Internal Complaints Committee (ICC).



The office-bearers of all departments and WDC, accompanied by the staff advisors of WDC met on 21.3.2023 to discuss the role of GSC & ICC as well as election to these bodies.

WDC organised several counselling sessions with Class Representatives to ensure participation of students in the Election Process. Over 100 students participated in counselling sessions held for Class Representatives and then for members of Gender Sensitising Committee.

The Elections of three students' representative to the ICC were completed on 11 April 2023.
