

Workshop on CV and S.O.P. Writing

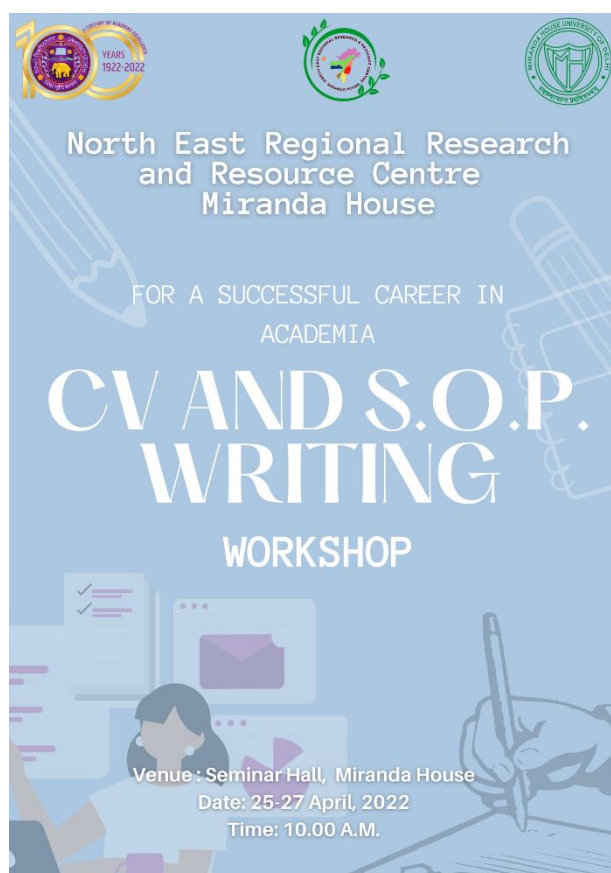
On the 25th of April 2022, the North East Regional Research and Resource Centre, Miranda House, organised a three-day CV and SOP writing workshop at the Seminar Hall of Miranda House. The workshop began at 10.00 A.M. and had 60 participants in groups of 20. The workshop was focused on providing participants with guidance on how to write effective CVs and SOPs, highlighting common mistakes, and including interactive sessions for practical learning.

The first day of the workshop was focused on understanding the purpose of a CV and SOP and how to tailor it according to different contexts. The facilitators gave a detailed presentation and explained how a CV and SOP are important tools for job applications, internships, and higher studies. The facilitators explained how these documents are crucial for job applications, internships, and higher studies. The presentation was followed by a Q&A session, where participants asked questions and clarified their doubts.

The second day of the workshop was focused on hands-on learning. The participants were assigned a facilitator who

provided individual attention and guided them through the process of writing their CVs and SOPs. The facilitators provided feedback on the participants' writing skills and helped them identify common mistakes. The interactive session allowed the participants to put their learning into practice, ask questions, and get feedback from experienced facilitators. For the same, participants were divided into groups of 20, and each group was assigned a facilitator who helped them develop their CV and SOP. The facilitators gave individual attention to each participant and guided them through the process of writing a CV and SOP.

The final day of the workshop was dedicated to feedback and evaluation. The participants shared their CVs and SOPs with the group, and the facilitators provided constructive feedback



to help them improve their documents. This feedback session was designed to help the participants learn from their mistakes and improve their writing skills. The interactive sessions were an integral part of the workshop, as they allowed the participants to put their learning into practice and learn from each other's experiences. The facilitators created a collaborative learning environment where participants were encouraged to ask questions and seek guidance.

Research Methodologies Workshop

The North East Regional Research and Resource Centre recently organised a Research Methodologies workshop from 12-14 May 2022. The workshop took place in Room No. 145, Miranda House, with 30 participants. The aim of the workshop was to provide participants with a comprehensive understanding of qualitative and quantitative research techniques, writing practices, and common mistakes that need to be avoided while conducting research. The workshop was organised to cater to those who wanted to develop their knowledge and skills in qualitative and quantitative research techniques, academic writing, and research design.

The workshop was divided into six sessions spread over three days. The first session, 'Fundamentals of Research,' aimed to provide participants with an overview of the various types of research, research designs, data collection, and data analysis methods. The session aimed to ensure that participants understood the basics of research well. The practical exercises in both sessions enabled participants to apply their learning and receive feedback on their skills.

The third day was dedicated to hands-on training on 'Synopsis and Thesis.' The sessions included 'Essentials of Academic Writing,' where the facilitators provided a detailed presentation on writing research proposals, thesis, and academic papers. The participants were given the opportunity to put their learning into practice and receive feedback on their writing skills. Participants were able to put their learning into practice by writing a synopsis and receiving feedback from the facilitators. The workshop ended with a session on 'Common Mistakes in Research and How to Avoid Them,' which was highly interactive, and participants were able to share their experiences and seek guidance on best practices.

Overall, the Research Methodologies workshop provided participants with a platform to learn, share, and apply their knowledge of qualitative and quantitative research techniques, writing practices, and common mistakes. Workshop on Research Methodologies - Introduction to Geographical Information Systems

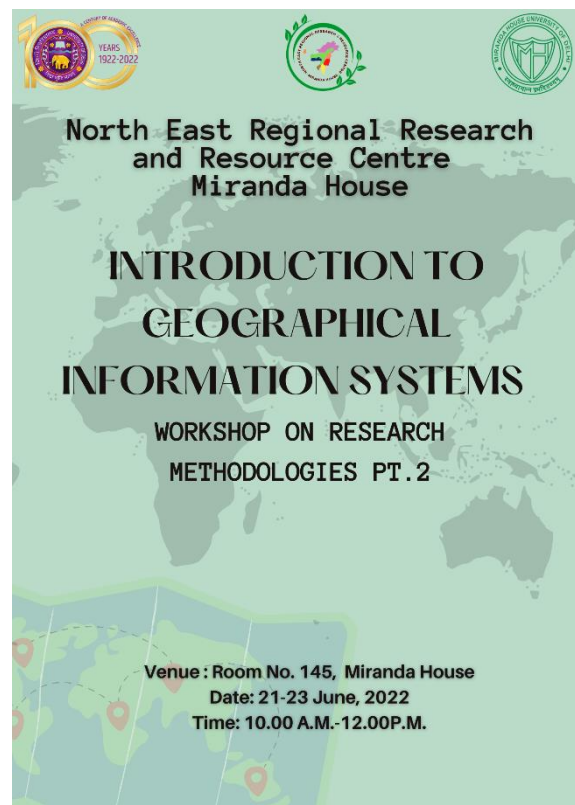

Workshop on Research Methodologies - E-Learning and Digital Tools for Students

On the 18th to 20th of July 2022, a workshop on e-learning and digital tools for students was conducted by North East Regional Research and Resource Centre, Miranda House. This was the third part of workshop on research methodologies. The aim of the workshop was to help participants understand the new digital platforms and how they can be used to improve students' marketability and skills. The workshop was held at Room No. 145, Miranda House and was attended by 30 participants from various disciplines.

The workshop consisted of several sessions, including E-learning, E-Content Design, Content Authoring Tools, Documentation & Presentation Tools, Graphics & Animation, Audio and Podcasting, Online Video Creation, Surveys/Polling/Quizzes, and Project Work: Development of E-Content. The sessions were interactive and hands-on, with participants actively engaging in discussions and practical exercises.

The E-learning session focused on the different types of e-learning and the benefits of e-learning over traditional classroom learning. The session on E-Content Design covered the basics of content design, including the use of multimedia, graphics, and interactivity. Content Authoring Tools session demonstrated the use of various tools used for authoring content, such as Adobe Captivate, Articulate Storyline, and Lectora.

The session on Documentation & Presentation Tools focused on the use of digital tools for creating and sharing documents, presentations, and reports. The Graphics & Animation session covered the use of graphic design software such as Adobe Photoshop and Adobe Illustrator for creating graphics and 2D/3D animation tools such as Adobe Animate and Blender.

The Audio and Podcasting session focused on the use of audio software and podcasting tools for creating and publishing audio content. The Online Video Creation session focused on the use of video creation software such as Adobe Premiere Pro and Final Cut Pro for creating and



editing videos. The Surveys/Polling/Quizzes session covered the use of online tools for creating surveys, polls, and quizzes.

The workshop concluded with a session on Project Work: Development of E-Content. Participants were divided into groups and were asked to develop e-content on a chosen topic using the tools and techniques learned during the workshop. A presentation of the projects by each group followed the session.

Overall, the workshop was well-received by the participants, who found it informative and helpful in understanding the various digital tools and platforms available for improving educational outcomes. The workshop provided a valuable opportunity for participants to develop their digital skills and to learn how to integrate digital tools into their teaching and learning practices.

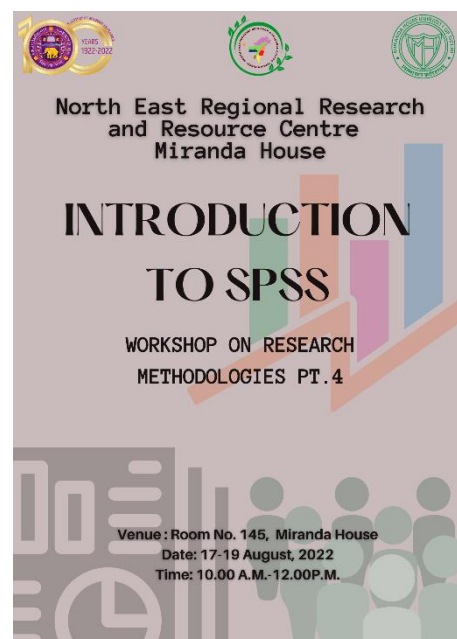

Workshop on Research Methodologies - Introduction to SPSS

The workshop on "Introduction to SPSS" was organised by the North East Regional Research and Resource Centre (NERRRC) at Miranda House from August 17 to 19, 2022. The workshop was held in Room No. 145 at Miranda House, with a duration of six hours each day, from 10.00 A.M. to 5.00 P.M. This was the fourth part of workshop on research methodologies. There was a total of 25 participants – who were students in various departments of Miranda House College.

The workshop aimed to introduce SPSS, a widely-used software package for statistical analysis in social sciences, business, and health sciences. The workshop covered various aspects of SPSS, starting from an introduction to the software to more advanced topics such as ANNOVA.

The workshop had 14 sessions, with each session focusing on a specific aspect of SPSS. The first session was an introduction to SPSS, providing an overview of its features and capabilities. The second session covered Data View, Variable View, Importing of Data, and Defining of Variables, which are essential steps in preparing data for analysis. The third session focused on Normality and reliability of Data, providing an understanding of how to assess whether data is normally distributed and reliable. Session four provided an example of interpretation, demonstrating how to analyse data using SPSS and interpret the results.



Session five covered the Chi Square Test, a statistical test used to analyse categorical data. The sixth session provided an example of interpretation of the Chi Square Test.

Session seven focused on t-Test (One Sample), a statistical test used to determine whether a sample mean significantly different from a known or hypothesised value. Session eight provided an example of the t-Test (One Sample) interpretation.

Session nine covered t-Test (Independent), a statistical test used to compare the means of two independent groups. Session ten provided an example of interpretation of the t-Test

(Independent). Session eleven focused on Correlation and Regression, providing an understanding of how to analyse relationships between variables and predict future outcomes based on those relationships. Session twelve provided an example of interpretation of Correlation and Regression analysis.

The last two sessions covered ANNOVA (One Way), a statistical test used to analyse differences between means of three or more groups and provided an example of ANNOVA (One Way) interpretation.

The workshop provided the participants with a comprehensive understanding of SPSS and its capabilities, allowing them to use the software for statistical analysis in their research work. Students, researchers, and faculty members from various disciplines attended the workshop, including social sciences, business, and health sciences. Overall, the workshop provided a comprehensive introduction to the use of SPSS for data analysis, including hands-on training and practical examples of data analysis and interpretation.
