Hello everyone!


Greetings from Pinnacle, The department of BA Programme, Miranda House.

#### **Defiance in Democracies**

Pinnacle, Department of B.A Programme on 20th September, 2019 hosted its inaugural Academic Seminar titled "Defiance in Democracies: Managing contending ideas of statehood" which addressed the changed Indian Federal structure with respect to Articles 370 and 35A.

The first Panelist was Mr. Wajahat Habibullah, a member of the Indian Administrative Services from Jammu and Kashmir cadre. Mr. Wajahat started his talk by explaining Articles 370 and 35A and emphasized the reason of discontentment being manner of implementation and not the abrogation. The next speaker was Mr. Rakesh Sharma, a retired Lieutenant General of Jammu & Kashmir. He demonstrated the uncanny silence in the valley after the August 5th decision and how it has also brought much needed attention towards the region of Ladakh. While speaking of communication blackout that was imposed in the region, sir highlighted security threats of dark-web and the necessity of strict measures by security agency. The final panellist Mr. Rahul Narayan is an advocate in the Supreme Court of India, who has worked in many landmark judgments including Aadhar litigation and right to privacy. He clarified legal and other constitutional aspects regarding Kashmir issue and concluded his talk with a message- 'that all we can do is to keep ourselves updated about the recent developments, because the biggest threat to peace in the valley is ignorance and misinformation.'

The speaker session was followed by a question round, where students were allowed to defuse their doubts and seek answers to their questions. This enlightening session came to an end, providing everyone with the cognizance of the fact, that defiance and resilience is an important part of a democratic system and the only way to resolve it is through dialogue and discussion.

## **Legal Literacy Workshop**

The Add-on-Course on Legal Literacy was organized in collaboration with Delhi State Legal Services Authority (DSLSA) from 23rd September 2019 to 4th October 2019.

The ten days workshop equipped the students with awareness sessions about laws and other judicial provisions, along with skill enhancement to use legal procedures to safeguard rights guaranteed to citizens.

The central theme of the workshop covered major topics of judicial system like Criminal Justice System, NALSA Witness Protection Scheme and Compensation Scheme, Women and Children Related Laws, Transgender Scheme and Benefits, Laws Related to Senior Citizens, Juvenile Justice, Laws related to Sexual Harassment. The workshop aimed at increasing understanding of governance and policy making. Judges from DSLSA busted myths prevailing around Indian judiciary by sharing personal experiences and humorous anecdotes. Mechanism of availing free legal aid was also explained to students

## Peace Building Seminar

On 24th October, 2019, the Department in collaboration with the Peace Building Project, conducted a seminar on the Refugee Crisis, titled, "Is there a Global Refugee Crisis or Is solidarity in crisis?". This event was graced by imminent speaker Ms. Tarana Faroqi, working with Fair Trade Forum India, UNHCR.

The Peace Building Project, an initiative founded at the University of Chicago, is a volunteer-led initiative that aims to prevent conflict, foster dialogue and create awareness on peacemaking. The event began with the screening of a documentary which focused on the refugees crisis in India fol lowed by a discussion on India's generosity which made its largest influx of refugees since the second world war. In addition to the current demographic statistics, the speaker explained various challenges that refugees face for not belonging originally to a country, varying from health issues, lack of education to psycho-social trauma, violence and harassment.

The Refugee Crisis thus remains most debated topic when every day 34,000 people around the world are forced to flee from their homes, with the hope to find safety and a better tomorrow. At the end everyone took a pledge to make the best in their capacity and help provide these refugees a "home" and not just a shelter.

I was really late to understand this and literally don't want any girl to be as late as I was. Just know yourself and your vagina otherwise it has the capacity to snatch your happy world.
